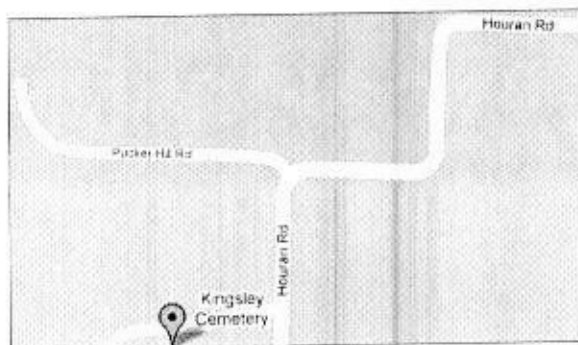

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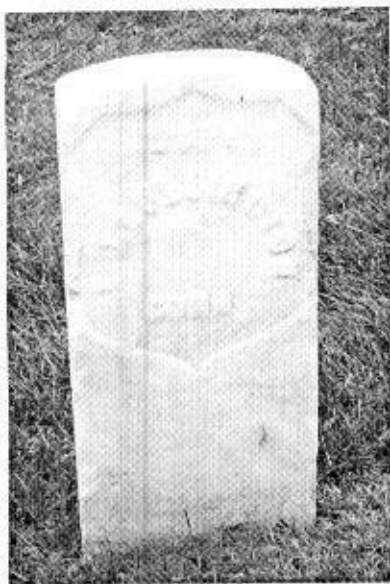

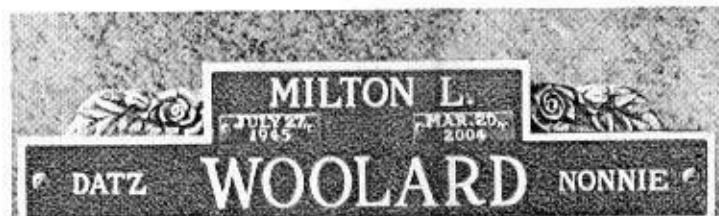

"The Sabbath Recorder", Vol 55, No 27, p 431, July 3, 1899...Lorenzo Coon was born in Alfred, N. Y., March 26, 1818, and died in Albion, Wis., June 18, 1899. When but a small boy his parents moved to Hebron, Pa., where, at the age of 14 years, he embraced religion, was baptized by Eld. Daniel Babcock, and united with the Hebron Seventh-day Baptist church. A short time after this his father died, leaving a family of ten children, two of whom were younger than Lorenzo. He, however, outlived them all, being the last of the ten to bid adieu to earth. In the year 1842 he came to Albion, Wis., and secured the farm near the village which for many years was his future home. Returning East, he formed the acquaintance of Miss Emeline Saunders, of Alfred, to whom he was married Nov. 26, 1846, and with whom he lived most happily for nearly 53 years. To them were born three daughters, two of whom have preceded him by several years to the spirit land. He returned to Wisconsin in 1848, improved his farm, built for himself and family a comfortable home, and by industry, frugality and honest toil acquired a fair amount of earthly possessions. He was a constituent member of the Albion Seventh-day Baptist church, and was deeply interested in her welfare and prosperity, contributing liberally to her support in all the lines of her work for the Master. A kind husband and father; an obliging neighbor; strictly honest in business; an exemplary Christian. It can be truthfully said of him, "A good man has gone." A disease of long standing which gradually undermined the vital forces, and which has caused him more or less suffering for many years, finally culminated in a severe attack about three weeks before his death, from which he could not rally; and after much pain and suffering, which he bore with patience, he cheerfully yielded up his spirit, rejoicing in the hope of a blessed immortality. On Nov. 26, 1846, she was married to Lorenzo Coon, who died June 16, 1899. Sister Coon accepted Christ in early life, and was ever a faithful follower of her Lord, and has left an example of Christ-like living well deserving of emulation. For many years she was a consistent member of the Albion Seventh-day Baptist church, and from which she has entered into that rest which remains for the people of God. Main, with whom she lived some thirty years, and by whom she had eight children, five of whom, with her husband, have already preceded her to the spirit land.  "The Sabbath Recorder", Vol 39, No 14, p 5, Apr. 5, 1883....*Elnora Coon Burdick*, daughter of Lorenzo and Emeline Coon was born in Albion, Wis., Sept. 19, 1848, died of consumption March 21, 1883, in the 35th year of her age. At the early age of thirteen years, Sister Burdick embraced the Saviour, was baptized by Eld. A. B. Burdick, and joined the church at this place. July 21, 1869, she was married to A. C. Burdick, formerly of Rockville, R. I., with whom she lived happily for nearly fourteen years, sanctifying the home, and though at times a great sufferer, she was always patient, loving, and kind, discharging faithfully the duties of wife and mother, and in her quiet and retiring way ever sought to influence all around her to a "higher life." She was one of the graduates of Albion Academy, having, by her studious habits and thorough work, won the confidence of all her associates and teachers, and was justly entitled to the honors conferred. Besides parents, two sisters, a husband, and many friends, she leaves two little boys, five and three years of age respectively, to travel the rugged ways of life without the watchful care and faithful counsels of a loving mother. "The Wisconsin Tobacco Reporter", Edgerton, Wisconsin, Mar. 14, 1919....*Albert Clarke Burdick* was born at Hopkinton, R. I., Aug. 2, 1840, as the sixth of eight children of Samuel and Mercy Crandall Burdick, all of whom have preceded him in death. At an early age he was taken from school and put to work in a cotton mill, which work he continued for several years. He had obtained but little schooling, but educated himself by private study and omnivorous reading, which continued almost to his death. Finally the family moved to Greenmanville, Conn., (now old Mystic), where he and some of his brothers learned the ship carpenter's trade in the shipyard of the Greenman bros. Shortly before he was 21, the civil war broke out and he volunteered for service, his was record being as follows: Mustered in at Stonington, Conn., June 21, 1861, in 5th Conn. Volunteers. Promoted to be corporal July 22, 1861. Promoted to be sergeant Oct. 16, 1863. Re-enlisted Dec 21, 1863, and given brief furlough home. Promoted to first Lieutenant Dec. 15, 1864, and made regimental Adjunct. Honorably discharged July 19, 1865, and brevetted captain. He fought in several important battles of the war and participated in Sherman's march to the sea. A natural leader of men, a tenor singer and banjo player of talent and a food story teller, he was a constant source of cheer to his comrades in campaign and barracks. After the war he returned to the parental home and was there at the death of both his parents in 1866. For a short time thereafter he worked in New York City, but soon felt the lure of the West and came to Albion, Wis., where his brother Samuel, had preceded him. He acquired the present home and became one of the village carpenters and soon joined the Albion S.D.B. church, in which he was for many years a faithful worker, tenor singer in the choir, teacher of a Bible class and moderator of the church. For a time while the church was without a pastor he supplied the pulpit and occupied the pulpit occasionally later. He was keenly interested in politics and, being naturally a good speaker, made political addresses, and was town clerk for years. These activities continued until advancing age and a little deafness compelled him to withdraw to some extent. On July 21, 1869, he was married to Elnora P. Coon, eldest daughter of Lorenzo and Emeline Coon of Albion, which wedlock continued until the death of the wife of tuberculosis, March 21, 1883. Of this marriage two sons were born, Lawrence W. of Chester, Pa., and Claude L. of Edgerton, Wis. He was married again Aug. 17, 1884 to Dora A. Webster, eldest daughter of John and Theresa Webster of Albion. Of this union four children were born: Mrs. Maude C. Whitford of Albion; Ray W., who was killed by a train at Stoughton, Wis., in 1904; J. Roy of Richmond, Calif.; and Baby Belle, who died in 1894 of meningitis, aged about 18 months; all others still living. Always interested in the affairs of the G.A.R., he has been for some years a member of the H. S. Swift Post at Edgerton and has been commander for the last three years. He attended the 50th anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg at Gettysburg, Pa., and other G.A.R. reunions. His health began to fail last summer and he was troubled with enlarged heart, finding it difficult to breathe and sleep. In November he sustained a bad fall while trimming trees, which may have hastened his death. This winter he became weaker and weaker and breathed his last on March 7, aged 78 years, 7 months, 5 days. Scores of buildings in and about Albion bear evidence of his activity as a carpenter who literally helped build the town for about half a century. He was a hard worker and took pride in all that he did. Aside from the immediate family, among those present at the funeral from out of town were A. E. Webster of Chicago, Mark Shackleton of Beloit, Mrs. M. J. Bilser of Madison and several civil war veterans of Edgerton.

When his country's life was threatened, he responded to her call, served his term of enlistment, endured some of the severest campaigns, passed through many hard fought battles, and returned honorably discharged from the service. For the last three years of his life, he suffered greatly with the disease which resulted in death. For a number of years he has been a member of the Albion Church. S. H. B.

 "The Sabbath Recorder", Vol 93, No 14, p 446, Oct. 2, 1922....*Elisha C. Main* was born in Hebron, Pa., August 26, 1842, and died at his home in Albion, Wis., July 31, 1992. He was the son of Ezekiel S. and Ann Janette Coon Main. He came with his parents to Albion in 1853, when he was about twelve years old. He was a veteran of the Civil War, serving in Co. D, Seventh Wisconsin, of the Iron Brigade. December 15, 1866, he was united in marriage with Orecelia Saunders, of Albion. Their children were all in attendance at the funeral: Louis L., of Rock Island, Ill.; Mrs. Edith Drake, of Exeland, Wis.; Mrs. Nettie Hibbard, of Walworth, Wis. There are nine grandchildren and five great grandchildren. He united with the Albion Seventh Day Baptist Church March 3, 1866, under the ministry of Elder Joshua Clark. He dearly loved children and would often entertain them with his old army drum, upon which he was a skilled performer. He will be remembered as always cheerful and patient even in suffering. He was a man not given to criticism of others but who enjoyed life, family and friends. L. D. S.

 "The Sabbath Recorder", Vol 71, No 8, p 254, Aug. 21, 1911....*Theresa Main* was born in Hebron, Pa., March 15, 1838, and died in Albion, Wis., July 25, 1911, in her sixty-fourth year. Her father was Dea. Ezekiel S. Main, one of the organizers of the Hebron Seventh-day Baptist Church. At about the age of twelve Theresa was led to accept Christ as her ideal of life, was baptized and united with the Hebron Church. In 1850 her family removed to Alfred, N. Y., where she attended school. Four years later she accompanied her parents westward to the town of Albion, in which she spent the remainder of her life. On Feb. 26, 1859, she was united in marriage to John O. Webster by the Rev. Thomas Babcock. The union thus formed continued for over fifty-two years and was terminated only by her death. Mrs. Webster's church membership was early transferred from the Hebron to the Albion Church, of which she has remained a humble but loyal and consistent

member. There remain to mourn her loss her husband, John O. Webster, five children - Mrs. C. C. Burdick, Mrs. F. J. Crandall, Mrs. W. A. McCarthy, Mrs. H. E. Lilly, and A. E. Webster - and two brothers, E. C. Main and L. J. Main. The large attendance at her funeral, on Friday afternoon, July 28, indicated the respect and esteem for her in the community. In the absence of Pastor Van Horn the services were conducted by Elder Babcock, who spoke words of comfort from 2 Cor. v. 1. S. H. B.

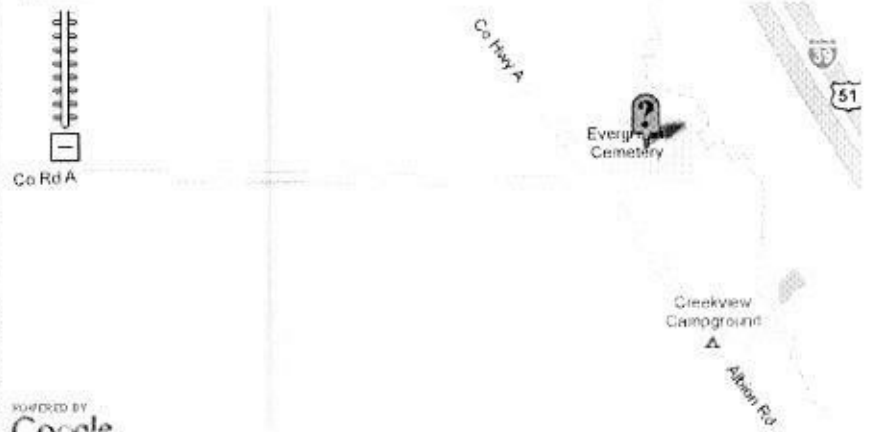

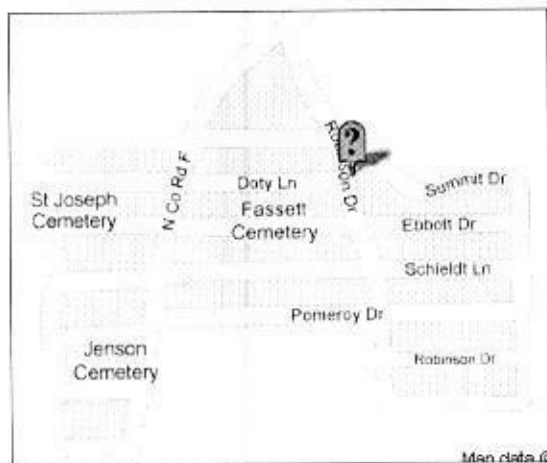

He spent some time in Milton in 1848 and then returned to New York state. In 1852 he again came to Milton to make his home. About a year after, he was married to Miss Martha Williams, a sister of Robert and Dennis Williams, so well known in Milton. They spent a year or two upon the farm of Nathan Maxson, whose wife was a sister of Mr. Wells, just west of what is now Milton Junction - the farm now owned by Mr. Paul. After this temporary residence Mr. Wells purchased and moved upon the farm in the southeastern corner of the town of Milton and the southwestern corner of the town of Lima where the remaining years of his active life were passed - coming into the village two or three years ago. To Mr. and Mrs. Wells were born one daughter, the wife of Mr. Oscar Freeborn, and Mr. Byron wells, whose home has been with the father for a number of years. Mrs. Wells departed this life about six years ago. A brother and an invalid sister still live in the state of New York and a half brother, Mr. Frank Wells of Elgin, Illinois, who attended the funeral. In youth, before coming to Wisconsin, Mr. Wells made a profession of religion and united with the Methodist church. From careful reading he came to a change of views regarding the Sabbath and was dropped from the membership of that church, and he never united with any other church. He was a great reader of the Bible acquiring an extended knowledge of its teachings; he strove, in his own quiet way, to live by its precepts. He was naturally possessed of a very retiring disposition which kept him from becoming widely known, for while everybody in this country round knew who he was, very few intimately knew him. He was industrious, careful, honest, and kind. He despised shams and makeshifts in religion and in business, but was quick to discover sincerity and prompt to aid honest endeavor. Y., but in 1845, when the subject of this notice was 18 years of age, they moved to Wisconsin, and settled in the town of Albion. In 1854 he was married to Miss Sara C. Carr, daughter of Peleg and Deborah Goodrich Carr and sister of S. C. and J. G. Carr, and in 1855 he moved to the farm in the western part of the town of Milton. In 1884 Mrs. Maxson died. Four of six children born to them died also, leaving Mr. Maxson with two children, a son, Mr. W. B. Maxson, and a daughter, now Mrs. T. I. Place. With these children he has had a home all the later years of his life, and by them he has been most tenderly cared for during the long years of failing health. Mr. Maxson traced his descent, in direct line, from one John Maxson, an early settler in New England, having taken active part in the affairs of the colony of Rhode Island as early as 1638. He inherited many of the sterling qualities which characterized the Maxsons of the colonial days. He was a man of strong convictions and independent thought, but a man of few words. He loved peace and sought the welfare of his fellow man. From early youth he was a member of the 2nd Alfred (N. Y.) S. D. B. church. The funeral was held at the home of his son, where the last years of his life were spent, Monday afternoon, conducted by Dr. Platts. The College Male Quartet sang two selections at the house and one at the burial. Thus Mr. Maxson passes from our sight but his name will long linger in the memory of Milton people.

Services will be held in the Seventh Day Baptist Church. Prof. Crandall was one of the best known men in the educational field in the state. He earned his degree in the local college, and has been professor of natural history at Milton since 1903. He was born in New York state in 1840 and entered Alfred University there in 1858. His studies were interrupted by the Civil war, in which he won the rank of lieutenant. Later he entered Milton college, winning degrees of B. A. in 1873; M. A. in 1876 and Ph. D. in 1885. Prof. Crandall then taught at Big Foot academy, Walworth, later entering Harvard as a special student for five years. Until 1896, he was engaged as a geological instructor and in

research work in various places, and in that year became a member of the Alfred university faculty. Seven years later he came to Milton college. 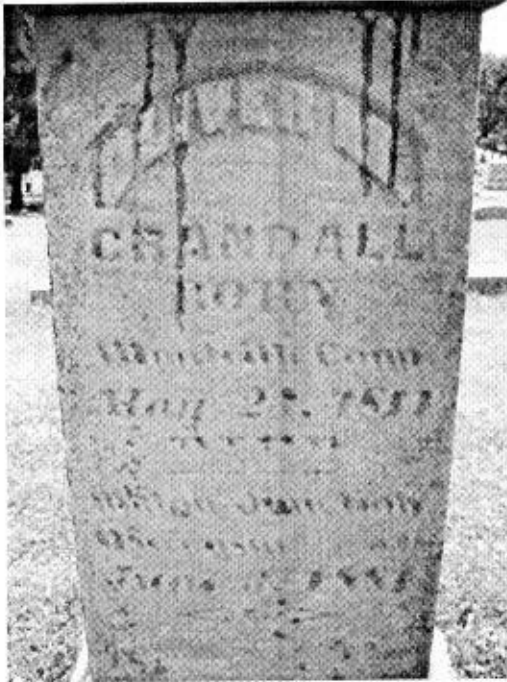

"The Sabbath Recorder", Vol 37, No 27, p 5, July 7, 1881. ... Of pneumonia, June 3d, 1881, Mr. Oliver M. Crandall, in the 71st year of his age. He was born in Montville, New London Co., Conn. When a young man, he moved to Alfred, and united with the First Alfred Seventh-day Baptist Church. In 1840, he moved to Wisconsin, where he spent the remainder of his days. For years, he seemed to be ripening in grace, and died triumphing in hope. The following, clipped from the Janesville Gazette, expresses the opinion of the writer: "Again death has been among us, and since our last writing has taken from our midst one of our oldest and most respected citizens, in the person of Mr. Oliver M. Crandall, who died at his home one mile north of this village [Milton Junction] on Friday night at 11 o'clock, of pneumonia, at the ripe age of 70 years, although he appeared in health at least ten years younger. Uncle Oliver, as he was familiarly called, was one of the early settlers of this community, and few men indeed have lived and died in our midst more loved and respected in life and lamented in death than he. He was for some years connected with the mail service in the capacity of transfer agent of this station, where he won encomium from all. For three years past he has resided upon his farm. His funeral was attended at the Seventh-day Baptist church on Sunday last by perhaps the largest audience yet assembled there on such an occasion." N. W.

Amos Sydney Crandall died at his late home in Milton Junction, March 9, 1916, aged ninety-three years, one month and twenty-eight days. Mr. Crandall was a descendant of the family of Crandalls who were prominent in the colonial history of Connecticut and Rhode Island. He was a fifth [actually seventh] generation removed from John Crandall, who came to the American colonies presumably in 1636. This ancestor was active in the civic and religious affairs of Rhode Island. He was a Baptist in his early belief and profession, but later became a member of the Seventh-day Baptist church organized at Newport, R. I., in 1671. Joseph, his third son, and the [great, great] great, great-grandfather of Amos, was a prominent minister of this denomination. Amos was born in Salisbury in Northwestern Connecticut, January 10, 1823, the second son of Henry Beebe and Lucinda Latimore Crandall. There were nine children in the family, four girls and five boys. The mother died in 1849. The father was married a second time in 1851 and to this couple was born a daughter, Ada Francesca, now Mrs. Forbes of Panama City, Fla. None of this family group is living excepting Amos' youngest sister, Mrs. Mary Stone of Oakland, Cal., and his half sister, Mrs. Forbes. In the autumn of 1823, Mr. Crandall's family moved to Alfred, Allegany Co., [N.Y.] to obtain lands in a new developing country and to secure and enjoy better religious privileges. The region was heavily timbered and the soil hard to cultivate. People of these modern times can little understand nor appreciate the formidable difficulties and hardships that confronted the men and women of those pioneer days when progress in clearing lands and making homes was slow; crops were scant and uncertain; money was scarce and the necessities of life costly. While these were times that taxed to the utmost the faith and courage and the physical endurance of men and women, yet they deepened moral and religious convictions; strengthened purposes and grounded character on a living faith in the truths of God. For fifteen years Amos' father lived in the vicinity of Alfred. In 1838, because of the financial depression and the almost total failure of crops the previous year, he decided to seek a home in the west, in the vicinity of the Great Lakes, a section that was opening up for settlement. He was accompanied on this trip by Joseph Goodrich and James Pierce. After looking over the favorable localities in Ohio, they finally determined to come to the Rock River country in Southern Wisconsin where on Du Lac prairie Mr. Goodrich purchased the claim on which Milton now is located and Mr. Crandall that on which Milton Junction now stands. On Sabbath-day, March 9, 1839, the families of Mr. Goodrich and Mr. Crandall, 22 in

number, met at the home of the former and organized a "Seventh day Baptist Moral Society" which conducted a Sabbath School each week and a prayer and conference meeting. Soon afterward this society became the Milton Seventh-day Baptist church. In June or July of 1839, a stirring revival began in the community. Among those who were converted was Amos who with three of his brothers was baptized and became a member of the Milton church. After the Seventh-day Baptist church at Milton Junction was organized he transferred his membership to the latter church in which he has worshipped and worked as a loyal, devoted, earnest Christian. On April, 1845, he was married to Arminda T. Frink who died in November 1856. To them was born one child, Henry Francis, who resides in Milton and is a deacon of the Milton Seventh-day Baptist church. In March 1858, he married Mary Odell who died in 1888. One son, George Amos of Milton Junction, was born to this union. September first, 1890, Mr. Crandall married Melissa Coon who entered into rest October 1914. Since her death Mr. Crandall has been cared for by his son George. He is survived by his two sons, nine grandchildren, and fourteen great-grandchildren, his sister, Mrs. Mary Stone and his half-sister Mrs. Forbes. Mr. Crandall was a farmer and always lived, since coming to the west, near or in Milton Junction. He was a quiet undemonstrative man who lived his religion in his daily life, in his associations with his friends and neighbors. He was a profound believer in his Creator and Father God. He loved his Bible as a book of light, joy and comfort, as God's open message to men. He was devoted to the church and entered into its services with eagerness. The funeral services were held on Sabbath morning, March 11, 1916, in the Seventh-day Baptist church at Milton Junction at the time of the usual hour for worship, and were in charge of the pastor, Rev. Henry N. Jordan who was assisted by Rev. George W. Burdick. A double quartet sang three comforting songs. He was laid to rest in the cemetery at Milton Junction.

 "The Milton Journal", Milton, Wisconsin, Thursday, Dec. 24, 1908, p2. ... The death of Clark Crandall which occurred last Friday, Dec. 18, removes from among us one who has been a resident of Wisconsin and for the greater part of the time, of Milton, for the last seventy years. He was born in Allegany Co., N. Y., Feb. 23, 1825, and came with his father's family to Wisconsin in 1838. He was the second son of Henry B. Crandall in whose family there were five sons and five daughters. Five of these, two sons and three daughters are still living. In youth and early manhood Mr. Crandall was a man of strong, vigorous constitution, active and alert in body and mind. He was ambitious for College training with a view to entering one of the learned professions; but some defect of eyesight forbade the study necessary to such an attainment and he turned his attention to farming. In 1847 he was married to Susan Lacy Stillman, daughter of John Stillman of Rock River who was also one of the early settlers in this country. Shortly after his marriage he joined a company of gold seekers and with them made the long journey to the newly discovered mining regions of California. The rough experiences of this journey and of the mining camp were congenial to his vigorous hardy nature. In the camp, also was proven the value of his literary tastes and of the store of good reading which he had acquired. His favorite author was Sir Walter Scott; and his reading of Marmion and the Lady of the Lake, and the thrilling adventures of the heroic characters of Ivanhoe and other of the historic tales relieved the tedium of many a long evening and brightened the life of men so far separated from home and friends. After a year or two spent in this way he returned to Wisconsin and with his young wife again took up the work of the farm with a good measure of success both in the town of Milton and on Albion Prairie. During these years there were born to them six children, four of whom died in infancy or early childhood and in such succession that their home was three times left childless. These sorrows with the increasing burden of years and the death of his wife, followed by property losses broke his constitution and changed the once social nature to that of a recluse. In this broken down condition his son, Charles H. Crandall, now of Boulder, Colorado, and his daughter Harriet, at teacher in Chicago have done all in their power to brighten his declining years. The funeral service was held on Sunday afternoon in the Seventh-day Baptist church of Milton Junction conducted by his life-long friend, Dr. Platts, assisted by his pastor, the Rev. T. J. Van Horn of Albion, and the Rev. A. J. C. Bond of Milton Junction. Beautiful music was furnished by the Milton College Male Quartet.

Among the other families who came about the same time was that of Henry Crandall, and in September, 1844, Silas H. Crandall and Harriet N. Stillman were married and established their home at Milton Junction, then called west Milton, in the southwest corner of Madison Avenue and Janesville Street, where Mrs. S. C. Chambers now lives. To them were born 10 children, eight of who are still living. Y., Feb. 24, 1833, and died of valvular disease of the heart in Milton Junction, Wis., May 19, 1904. His father and mother were Baptists and attendants of that church, so that his early religious training was with them. The family came to Wisconsin in 1844, coming by the way of the Erie canal to Buffalo and by lake steamer thence to Milwaukee and they made their first settlement on a farm a few miles south of Ft. Atkinson. In 1848 they moved to Spring Prairie, in Walworth county, where the father died and the son was left at this early age to his own resources. About this time Brother West attended a district school where the teacher was especially good and under his encouragement he came to have a great desire for a college education; and with this object in view, he accompanied this teacher to Oberlin, Ohio, and entered the school. There was a great revival of religion in progress at the time, and Bro. West was soon among the seekers for Christ, whom he found and greatly rejoiced in forgiveness of sins and the hope of eternal life. The professors in the college gave great encouragement to the converts. Every session of the classes was opened by prayer and these young people were often invited to lead in these devotions, thus receiving a training similar to that now received in the Young People's societies. For various reasons Mr. West did not remain long in Oberlin, but returning to Spring Prairie he united with the Baptist church of that place. In 1849 for the purpose of gratifying his desire for a higher education he came to Milton Academy, where he became a convert to the Sabbath of the Lord and since then he has been faithful in its observance. Although he did not obtain the liberal training he desired for himself, his interest in training schools continued as shown in the generous contributions made at various times for their support. At the age of seventeen he taught his first district school and in this work he became quite proficient. Sept. 23, 1852, he was married to Isaphena, daughter of Ethan and Amy Allen Burdick, of Lima. In 1854 they moved to Utica, Dane county, Wis., and a year from that time he united with the Seventh-day Baptist church of that place, remaining a faithful and efficient member until its dissolution. In December, 1865, he was elected and ordained a deacon of that church. A very large part of his active and useful Christian life was spent in teaching or superintending Sabbath schools, and he did considerable institute work among the Sabbath schools of this section of the country. He was often called to serve his fellow citizens in offices of honor and trust and was especially efficient and satisfactory in his work and in his wise counsel to those who sought his aid. For twenty-six consecutive years he has been the treasurer of the Seventh-day Baptist Northwestern association and a member of its executive committee. In June 1901, Bro. West became a member of the Milton Junction S. D. B. church. His long life has been filled with usefulness and faithful service and this church feels greatly its loss. He leaves a wife, one son, Allen B. of Lake Mills, Wis.; two daughters, Mrs. W. H. Allen of Alfred, N. Y., and Mrs. W. D. Burdick of Nile, N. Allen Burdick West was born July 15, 1856, at Utica, Dane county, where the West family were pioneer settlers. He grew to manhood there, attending the local school and also Albion academy and the Whitewater State Teachers college, then known as the Whitewater Normal. After his graduation he began teaching, a profession which he followed until his retirement a few years ago. Y., October 15, 1831, and died at Milton Junction, Wis., January 31, 1913, being in the eighty-second year of his age. He was married September 3, 1853, to Juliette Crandall of Brookfield, and there they first made their home. When their first child was about two years old they came west, settling at Walworth, Wis. During the Civil War they started for Minnesota but owing to the unsettled condition of the country, they thought it not wise to continue the journey at that time; so they halted in the Rock River vicinity and spent a year or so on a farm there. At the close of the war they proceeded to Minnesota where Mr. Crandall took up a homestead. After six or eight years residence there, where they endured the hardships of pioneer life incident to those early days on a Minnesota prairie, they again came back to Walworth to live. In 1890 they removed to Milton Junction, where they have since made their home, surrounded by their children and grandchildren who have comforted them in their declining

years by their love and care. Mr. and Mrs. Crandall lived together nearly sixty years, maintaining a christian home which has always been an influence for good in the community, and which has stamped its character upon the homes established by their children. In early life Mr. Crandall was baptized and joined the Seventh Day Baptist church. Wherever he went he joined the local church of that faith, assisting in the organization of a church in Minnesota. He died in the fellowship of the Milton Junction church. He was a good citizen, quiet and law abiding. He was one of that class of sturdy, honest pioneers which settled this Middle West. A class which is rapidly passing on; men who wrought well in their day, and who set a standard of citizenship which the present generation should seek to maintain. For many years Mr. Crandall has been in feeble health, and in his last sickness he expressed repeatedly his desire to go. He had his desire. His form so erect and straight, will be seen on our streets no more. His death is the first break in his immediate family, and of his twenty-nine descendants but two have died, a grandchild and a great-grandchild. His children are Mrs. E. O. Crandall, Mrs. O. G. Crandall, Mrs. Geo. E. Coon, and John B. Crandall, all of Milton Junction, Mrs. F. O. Burdick of Boulder, Colo., and Sherman Crandall of Brodhead. He is also survived by two brothers, William C. Crandall of Boulder, Colo., and Paul B. Crandall of Walworth. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in the Seventh Day Baptist church conducted by the pastor, Rev. A. J. C. Bond. Interment was made in the Milton Junction Cemetery.

Cora May Crandall, a daughter of Roswell A. and Juliette Crandall, was born in Walworth, Wis., June 4, 1860 and entered into her eternal rest July 21, 1913. Mrs. Crandall's father had passed to the life beyond but a short time before, and her death was the first break in the family circle of four sisters and two brothers, Mrs. F. O. Burdick of Boulder, Colo.; Mrs. E. O. Crandall, Mrs. G. E. Coon, Mr. John Crandall of Milton Junction; Mr. Sherman L. Crandall of Brodhead, Wis. On April 18, 1881 she was united in marriage to Orville G. Crandall at Utica, Wis. Into this home were born two children, Eldon D. and Jennie. Besides a sorrowing husband and children, the deceased leaves an aged mother, the three sisters and two brothers, and a large circle of friends to mourn the loss of a devoted wife, an affectionate mother, a loving sister and a good neighbor. Y., and died at Milton Junction, Wis., February 24, 1910, in the 87th year of his age. He was the oldest of a family of eleven children and one adopted sister, of whom three sisters, Mrs. Narcissa Champlin, Mrs. Jane Champlin of Alfred, N. Y., and Mrs. Janetta Coon of Milton, Wis., and Mrs. Etta Jones of Belvidere, Ill., adopted sister, still survive him. When a child seven years old his parents moved to Allegany county, N. Y., and settled on a farm in the town of Genesee, where he grew to manhood. He was married to Miss Frances Grace Green, daughter of Elder Henry P. Green, February 15, 1846. In 1851 they came to Wisconsin. He purchased a farm near Utica, Dane county, which was his home until moving to Milton Junction in 1885. 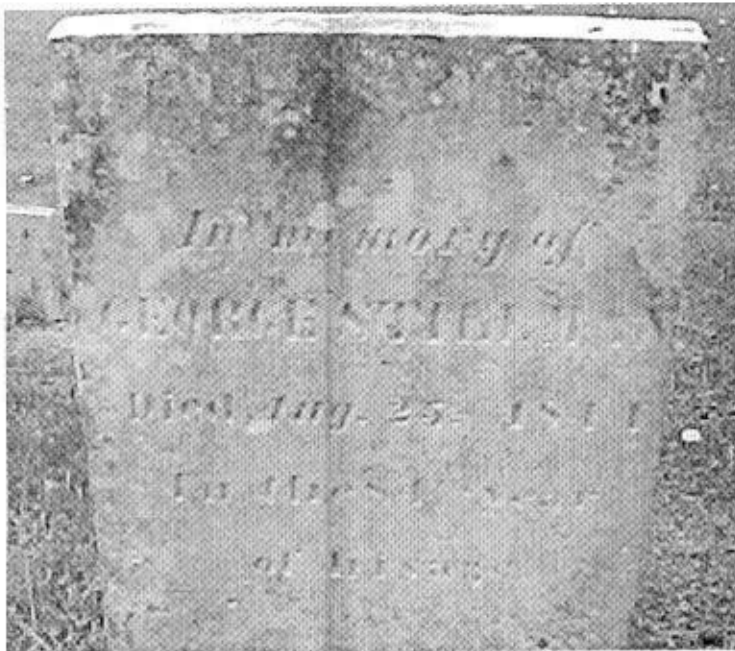

Telephone", Thursday, July 25, 1946, p 5.Orville Gillette Crandall, 91, a resident of Milton Junction for 55 years, passed away Tuesday, July 23, in Mercy hospital, Janesville, where he had been a patient for the past few weeks. He had been in failing health for some time. Mr. Crandall was born in Utica, Wis., May 29, 1855, the son of Edwin Morris and Frances Green Crandall, and lived there until early manhood. On April 18, 1881, he was married to Miss Cora May Crandall at Utica where they lived until moving to Milton Junction in 1891. To them were born two children, Eldon of Battle Creek, Mich., and Jenny, now Mrs. Robert Green, of Milton Junction. Mrs. Crandall dies July, 1913. "The Sabbath Recorder", Vol 43, No 24, p 5, June 16, 1887. ... In Albion, Wis., May 4, 1887, Mr. John Stillman, aged 85 years. Bro. Stillman was born in Berlin, Rensselaer Co., N. Y., and was the son of Geo. Stillman. While young, he moved, with his father, to Alfred; experienced religion and was baptized by Eld. Satterlee, and joined the Alfred Church Dec. 21, 1821; was married to Lovina Wells, who, but a few years ago, passed over the river and there awaits his coming. In 1839, Brother Stillman, with his family, came to Wisconsin, and settled at Rock River; and, when the Milton Church was organized, became one of its constituent members. Later, when the Rock River Church was organized, he became a constituent member of that church. Since that, he removed to the vicinity of the Albion Church; and, in the spring of 1865, joined that church, of which he was a member at his death. Bro. Stillman was a man of but few words, but he faithfully maintained his profession, and filled his place with the people of God. In the latter part of his life he fell into a decline, and became entirely blind and quite deaf, yet he enjoyed visits from friends, and especially conversation upon religious subjects. His funeral was held at the Rock River church, and he was buried in the cemetery by the side of his wife. A sermon was preached by Eld. J. C. Rogers to a large assembly of relatives and friends, from 2 Cor 5: 1. J. C. R.

In 1822, she put on Christ by open profession, and united with the First Alfred Church, where she remained a worthy member until the year 1839, when she with her family removed to Milton, Wis. She was among the little band who first planted the banner of the cross, amid the storms and conflicts of a frontier life in that place. When the Rock River Church was organized [in 1856], she was again among those who first covenanted together in church obligation. At the time of her death, she was a member of the Albion Church. For many years she had been an invalid, patiently awaiting the summons that should relieve her of earth's trials. On account of ill health, she was deprived of church privileges; but long a student of the Bible, and blessed with a retentive memory, she never was without the consolation of the Gospel, and finally died in the triumphs of faith, leaving a large circle of friends to mourn their loss, and rejoice in her eternal gain. "The Milton Journal", Thursday, Sep. 20, 1900, p 1. ... The death of "Uncle" John Stillman, which occurred at Albion the 15th inst., removes another of the early settlers in this part of Wisconsin. He was the son of John and Lovina Wells Stillman, and was born in Alfred, N. Y., December 9, 1824. In the year 1838, or 1839, the family moved to Wisconsin settling upon a farm on Rock River. In young manhood Mr. Stillman was married to Miss Clarissa Main of Albion, and settled upon that part of the father's farm now owned by C. D. Balch. There he lived until his children grew up and his wife died thus breaking up the home. Since then he has lived in Albion and Milton a greater part of the time, occasionally making extended visits among his children. His eldest daughter, Mrs. Green Millard, well known in Milton, died two or three years ago; another daughter, Mrs. W. H. Ernst lives at Dodge Centre, Minn., and another in the state of Washington; one son resides in Duluth and the eldest son, Horace, lives at Albion. At the home of this son Mr. Stillman was tenderly cared for during his last sickness. Two sisters also survive him, Mrs. Silas Crandall of Rock River, and Mrs. Thomas Rogers of Waterford, Conn. In religious faith and practice Mr. Stillman was a Seventh-day Baptist having united with the church of that order in Alfred, N. Y. When the Milton church was organized, in 1840, he and his sister, now Mrs. Crandall, were constituent members. Though he had several times changed his membership, he had returned to Milton and was a member of that church until his death. Mrs. Crandall has never changed her membership, and is the only person who has held continuous membership in the church since its organization sixty years ago. Mr. Stillman was a man of strong convictions, which were usually founded upon careful reading and much thought. He loved truth and hated hypocrisy and shams. In politics, he was a Republican, and only a few days before his death, he expressed the hope that he might live long enough to vote again for Mr. McKinley. The funeral occurred Monday morning. Brief services were held at Albion, the body was taken to the church at Rock River, where funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Dr. Platts, and the remains were laid to rest beside those of his wife who died in 1890.

"The Sabbath Recorder", [Vol. 47, No. 15, p. 252] ... The Rev. James C. ROGERS died at his home in Milton Junction, Wis., on Wednesday morning, April 1, 1891. About one year ago he had a severe attack of la grippe from which he never fully recovered, at last he had a complication of difficulties and general decline. Last June he visited the scenes of his boyhood, hoping to be benefited in health by the change. He returned in September, apparently much better, but it proved to be only a temporary improvement, as he soon began again to fail, medical skill and kindly nursing by willing hands proved unavailing, and he closed his earthly career beloved by all who knew him. The funeral was held at the Milton Junction Seventh-day Baptist church on April 3d, and was largely attended by those of nearly all shades of belief. The sermon was preached by the writer, Elds. Wardner and Dunn and Pres. Whitford assisting in the services. Eld. Bond assisted at the residence. Mr. ROGERS was born in Waterford, Conn., May 23, 1822. He accepted Christ and united with the Waterford Seventh-day Baptist Church in the autumn of 1837, under the labors of Alexander CAMPBELL. In the year 1840 he took up his residence at Preston, N.Y., here he labored in revival meetings as a lay worker associated with Eld. Jabez SWAN, a noted revivalist. In the spring of 1844 he was married to Miss Clarinda MILLER, of DeRuyter, who survives him. He again removed to Waterford, where he was engaged as captain of a Georgia Bank fishing schooner. While living here he was licensed to preach. After about two years he accepted a call to become pastor of the DeRuyter Seventh-day Baptist Church. He was ordained, by request of this church, at the General Conference held at Leonardsville, N.Y., Sept. 7, 1855. He at once moved to Southampton, Ill., becoming pastor of the church at that place; here he remained three years. He next accepted the pastorate of the church at Edgerton, Wis., remaining two years. In the year 1860 he located as pastor of the Rock River Church remaining in this charge until about eight years ago. After he resigned the pastorate he preached for this church for about two years more as supply. He was father of five sons and two daughters; four of the sons are interred in the Rock River Cemetery, where his remains were laid away, the remaining children are still living. There are many homes in Southern Wisconsin into which he has brought gospel consolation and comfort in hours of

bereavement and sorrow. He was very sympathetic in his nature and had a kind word for all. He will be greatly missed. There is "One less to bind to earth, One more to love in heaven." G. W. H.

Brother Burdick was born in Berlin, N.Y., and in early life removed with his parents to Alfred, where, while quite young he experienced religion, and united with the First Alfred Church. In 1856 he came to Wisconsin and settled near Milton. Here he was within a few years bereft of his wife, Phebe Celestia, a woman respected and beloved by all who knew her, the daughter of Abel G. Burdick, formerly of Verona, N.Y. Bro. Burdick married for his second wife H. Lovinia, daughter of Deacon A. P. Stillman, and having settled in Utica, he united with the Utica church, in June, 1867, of which he was a faithful and zealous member till his death. Bro. Burdick followed peddling for many years, and was known to be scrupulously honest in all his dealings. He was keenly alive to every Christian obligation and so sensitive to his convictions of duty as to suffer wrong, lest he might do wrong. His funeral was held at the Rock River Church, and his remains buried there beside those of his first wife. His widow and a son survive him.

Burdick, and daughter of Abel G. and Nancy Burdick, in the 33d year of her age. Sister Burdick professed religion about the age of 13, and united with the 2d Seventh-day Baptist Church of Verona, N.Y.; and after her removal to Wisconsin in 1858, she with her husband united with the Milton Church, of which she continued a faithful member until called to "be with Christ." In the death of Sister Burdick, the church has not only lost one of its faithful members, but the Recorder also one of the poetical contributors to its columns - Celestia. In her uninterrupted patience, as expressive of her perfect victory over the "terrors of death," she selected for her text, to be used on her funeral occasion, Ps. cxviii. 5: "I called upon the Lord in distress: the Lord answered me, and set me in a large place."

Rogers, from Rom. 21: 4, "And God shall wipe away every tear from their eyes; and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning nor crying, nor pain any more."

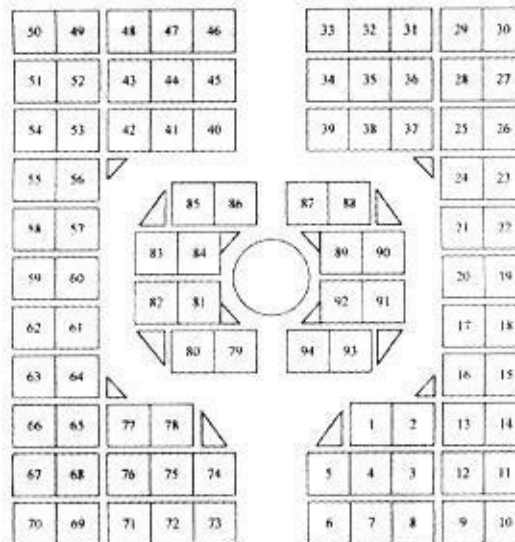
